2.1 Hosting Mayor's welcome

Maranoa Mayor Cr Tyson Golder welcomed attending delegates to the meeting. He spoke of the proud fishing tradition in the Maranoa region and how Maranoa River is Australia's second fastest flowing river in Australia.

2.2 Chair, Region 12

Cr Richard Marsh welcomed all attendees to the inaugural meeting of Murray Darling Association Region 12 Councils. He thanked Cr Golder for hosting the meeting as Roma was the most central site for this group of councils.

2.3 Member for Maranoa

Member for Maranoa Mr David Littleproud told attendees that it was important he was at the meeting as the Murray Darling Basin Plan was a very topical issue and he was the only Queensland Federal Member of Parliament whose constituents were impacted by the Plan. He acknowledged the advocacy work done by the Balonne Shire Council with Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce was instrumental in getting the Northern Basin Review target adjusted from 390GL to 320GL. He hoped this renewed target would be accepted by Senate. He noted compliance was an issue across the basin.

4.1 Chair, Region 12

Cr Marsh is the inaugural Chair of Region 12 MDA Inc and will be in the role for 12 months. Region 12 consists of the 15 Queensland councils situated in the Murray Darling Basin which covers 179 local government authorities. He advised Scenic Rim Regional Council has requested not to be part of Region 12.

Attendees also felt that it was important to involve their councils in more actively developing a shared understanding of and commitment to the processes of the MDA before formally voting on positions that may then imply a position of council.


In the interests of good governance, attendees resolved instead that the following items were discussed, and agreed upon unanimously by those in attendance.

- a) That Region 12 supports the Basin Plan to be implemented in accordance with the legislation as it is written giving consideration to its capacity to provide amendments to the sustainable diversion limits through consultation with the community.
- b) That Region 12 supports the recommendations of the Northern Basin Review and seeks to ensure there is no further recovery above the recommended 320GL. Region 12 also calls on governments of all persuasions across the Basin to provide support for a good outcome for all. (Background Region 12 recognises the importance of ensuring there are no adverse social, environmental and economic impacts on southern basin communities.)
- c) That Region 12 requests the Chair raise the resolutions with the MDA Board at the next Board meeting seeking basin-wide support for the resolution.
- d) That the Chair and CEO of Region 12 arrange an appropriate time for a co-ordinated event for the organisation to address member and prospective member councils across thee region.

Introduction

Local government has a key role to play in the future of the Murray Darling Basin. As the peak representative body for local government across the Basin, the MDA is responsible for ensuring that our actions always deliver value to our members by ensuring a strong alignment with our Purpose.

As such, our Purpose provides the bedrock for our activities, and those activities are identified and agreed in the following workplan for the year ahead.

Our Strategic Plan provides the framework for the 2017 Workplan, which connects via a 'clear line of sight' from the Strategic Plan to our operational activities.

Further, the actions and activates identified in this workplan align with the CEO's performance indicators and may be used as a measure of their performance in the role.

The key focus of the 2017 workplan is to build the capacity within our regions, ensuring strong governance and active engagement and thereby providing the imprimatur for the MDA to speak with authority about Basin matters on behalf of local government:

Limiting factors

Our reality is that we have a limited income base which, in turn, restricts what we can do, and how many we can employ to do it.

As such, we must ensure that Murray Darling Association is, and is seen to be a key Basin partner. To do this with limited resources means that we must be considered in our activities; do the right things and do them well.

The 2017 Workplan identifies the crucial elements reguired in order to deliver against our Purpose, and sets out the actions that will provide the greatest value and effect. If we are restricted in what we can do, let's ensure that each activity adds to a firm foundation and structure for the following year's work.

OUR HISTORY

- The Murray Darling Association initially formed in 1944 with the objective of providing sufficient water supplies and hydro-electricity to support sustainable production in agriculture, business and industry across the basin.
- This organisation was instrumental in securing support for the Snowy River Diversion and its associated hydro electricity scheme.
- Today, with the implementation of the Basin Plan impacting every community across the basin, the purpose of the MDA has never had greater relevance.

First...a couple of basic principles:



- MDA advocates for the Basin plan to be implemented in accordance with the legislation
- The 450GL 'upwater' can only be recovered under the Plan if the impacts of the recovery are have neutral or beneficial socio-economic impact.
- Without a strong voice for local government at the state and federal level the opposing positions of the states on this issue will place our communities at risk.



Our Position is Our Members Position

So what **IS** the MDA's position on the 450GL?

- That any consideration of recovery of the 450GL up water must comply with the conditions stipulated under the Act.
- That the assessment of socio-economic neutrality must be evidence based and follow agreed assessment criteria.
- That assessment process must be informed by local knowledge across all regions of the Basin






Regionalisation

This work will be guided by regional engagement plans – the whole organisation has a role in implementing these plans.




Basin-wide Compliance Review
